MEET

ADÈLE TALTY

MEMBER SINCE 1988

SOPRANO

Singing with MasterVoices has been a part of Adèle's life for almost forty years, including nine years serving on its Board of Directors. During that time, she has sung almost every concert, even while raising four children in Westchester.

Originally from Connecticut, Adèle moved to New York City after graduating from Boston College and worked as a writer for SELF magazine in the Sex, Relationships and Love department, interviewing experts like Dr. Ruth Westheimer in addition to Dr. Anthony Fauci during the height of the AIDS epidemic. After SELF, she was the managing editor of Bottom Line Personal, a newsletter with a readership of one million.

"MasterVoices has provided me with a creative outlet apart from my other responsibilities. Singing varied repertoire and sharing the stage with major opera, musical theater and pop music talents has been an incredible experience", says Adèle. Her kids are impressed that she sang at the 1999 MTV Video Music Awards hosted by Chris Rock at the Metropolitan Opera House.

As a Board member, Adèle has served on the Development and Special Events Committee which plays a crucial role in generating funds for a huge portion of MasterVoice's annual budget. "The financial environment for arts organizations is so challenging. As singers we don't see the struggle and effort that goes into finding the resources for our programming."

Adèle recently moved back to New York City and is a member of the Literary and Music Committees at the National Arts Club and will soon be off to Provence, France to pursue another passion--biking.



MEET

ANGELA MILNER

MEMBER SINCE 1998

Music has always been a part of Angela's life. Her mother was an aspiring concert pianist, and Angela sang professionally with her mother's choir from the time she was eight years old. This early exposure to music earned her a full scholarship that led to a degree in education and music from Hofstra University. Angela recalls singing the Brahms Requiem in Verbier, Switzerland, as her "most memorable experience" with the chorus.

While raising two children, Angela taught nursery school and a course in Creativity at Suffolk Community College. Her late husband of fifty-five years, Carl, always encouraged Angela to explore her artistic side which she pursued for many years at her Brooklyn studio. Working in a medium known as encaustic painting (combining warm beeswax, varnish and pigment), Angela has had multiple exhibits of her work - including solo shows- and was favorably reviewed by the NY Times. In 2003, she collaborated with her singer/songwriter sister Laura Wetzler, and produced a concert and art exhibit at Merkin Hall entitled "Kabbalah Music: Songs of the Jewish Mystics." Her "Sephilot," created for that show, now hangs in the main foyer of Stephen Wise Synagogue in Manhattan.

"Exploring new things in life is important" Angela notes, stressing that "Music can get you through some very difficult moments in life." Angela treasures the friendships she has made in the chorus and shares her passion for music and art with her six grandchildren.

ARLENE BERROL

"I joined The Collegiate Chorale through the back door", says Arlene. "I sang with the Rhode Island Civic Chorale, which Bob Bass (former Music Director of The Collegiate Chorale) conducted for several years. Eventually he stopped coming to RI, so I joined to continue singing with Bob."

Originally from New York, Arlene's life has been "a tale of two cities". Various marriages and partnerships kept bringing her back to Providence. Arlene was a music major at Wellesley, planning to become a professional musician; instead, she earned a Master's degree in social work at Columbia and continues her private practice as a social worker and therapist. "I work with couples with anxiety and depression. I love the contribution I can make to people."

Arlene commutes from Rhode Island to attend rehearsals every Monday night. "I love being part of the MasterVoices group. With Bob I loved everything we did, singing at Carnegie Hall, with the best known opera singers. The trips to Israel singing with the Israel Philharmonic and Zubin Mehta, and with James Levine at Verbier were extraordinary experiences. I also love Ted Sperling and his enthusiasm. He is so gifted and always produces something creative."

"MasterVoices, being a therapist, my kids, and my grandchildren are my passions. I want to sing until I no longer can. It makes me feel so alive."

CAREY WHITE

At Manhattan School of Music, where she studied from first grade to college, Carey studied violin and voice. As a child, she was invited to sing as part of a children's chorus in the college's opera production. The children's chorus sang at many events, including singing the Chorus of Angels in Boito's *Mephistofele* at the Richard Tucker Gala with the Collegiate Chorale in 1988.

Carey's work has always involved teaching music and violin. In her twenties, she was the lead singer in a band called Funkey Monkeys which performed kids' shows, toured and made four albums. Today, Carey works as a violinist and artistic director of violin ensembles at the Thurnauer School of Music School in Tenafly, New Jersey and as a middle school music teacher at Solomon Schechter in Bergen County. "We play all kinds of classroom instruments and take musical field trips." Carey balances all this while raising four children, ages 6-14 and notes "My husband is very supportive".

With MasterVoices, Carey has especially enjoyed singing anything Sondheim, as well as *Carmen* with "the production's inventiveness, modernization and accessibility." It's no wonder her life is about music--there have been musicians in Carey's family for four generations. "Music is for me the gift that keeps on giving. My family gave me these opportunities so I want my students to have similar experiences."

Carlos joined MasterVoices thru the Side by Side program when he was a student at Life Sciences Secondary School. He went on to get his bachelor's degree from City College where he studied classical voice performance, and is currently finishing his master's degree in music education at Hunter College.

Becoming a high school vocal teacher is one of his goals, but Carlos also wants to continue performing. Not only does he perform with the Bronx Opera Company, he also writes his own music, is in a band, plays guitar, and sings mostly in the rock and indie alternative genres. He feels fortunate to have had the unique opportunity to perform in *Lady in the Dark* at two different venues: with MasterVoices at Carnegie Hall and with the Bronx Opera Company recently at Lehman College.

One of his best MasterVoices memories is performing in *27*, since it was his first time being on stage at New York City Center while singing with a large chorus with a full orchestra, magnificent soloists, costumes, and sets. He describes his MasterVoices experience as thrilling, eventful, eye-opening, and exciting.

Notwithstanding a busy career, David felt the need for another outlet for his energy and artistic interests. In 2022 he joined the Board of Directors of MasterVoices and very quickly realized that he also wanted to sing in the chorus. "I didn't care for Gilbert and Sullivan in my youth, but singing *Iolanthe* changed my point of view," says David.

David was raised in the UK and after graduating from Oxford earned his PhD in physics at MIT. But a career in science, industry or academia did not appeal to him. He now works for a hedge fund, "training computers to analyze market trends for investment management. The quantitative skills and problem-solving approach that is the heart of my scientific training is actually what is needed to predict market trends," notes David.

David enjoys MasterVoices' eclectic repertoire which allows him to indulge his passion for classical music and also explore both opera and theater. "Having to make Monday night rehearsals is a guilty escape for a few hours" from his busy family life with his wife and four children.

David feels that he and the other singer-members of the Board of Directors play an important role in integrating the many aspects of the MasterVoices community.

David is an accomplished choral singer lending his talents to several choruses in addition to MasterVoices. "I love the special experience MasterVoices provides of exploring new or under-appreciated music, and the way Ted puts a different spin on some traditional pieces" says David.

Growing up on Long Island, David took part in traditional high school music programs such as chorus, band and theater. He took a break from singing while at MIT earning his BA in Humanities and Science, and while he and his wife raised their two sons in suburban New Jersey.

David began his career as a stage manager but ultimately moved to the business side of the entertainment industry working for, among others, MSG, Radio City, and on Broadway. David is particularly proud of his work at Understood.org/Poses Family Foundation which focuses on neurodivergent people and their allies. He now serves as Director of Finance and Administration for the National Dance Institute. Founded by Jacques d'Amboise 50 years ago, National Dance Institute provides dance curriculum in over 50 New York City public schools which, David says, is a "transformative experience" for students.

David says he is always impressed with the level of singing at Master Voices - a high compliment from someone who sings with so many choruses in the NY/NJ metropolitan area.

Deb's passion for musical theater and her special niche as a lyricist may seem like an unlikely path for a Tufts math major with a thirty-year career as an actuary with John Hancock Life Insurance Company. But even while Deb was working in Boston she started Overture Productions, a not-for-profit theater group that mounted three musical theater productions with top Broadway talent.

After retirement, with her son and two grandchildren settled in Tennessee, Deb relocated to New York City and has continued to develop her craft as a lyricist, studying at Juilliard and with BMI Musical Theater Workshop. "Back in 2016 when I discovered there was a chorus in New York City that performed a mix of theater, opera, and classical repertoire, led by the legendary Ted Sperling, I thought I must have dreamt it up myself. What could be better? --Being invited to join! Singing with MasterVoices is one of the biggest joys of my musical life."

From her first season, which included *Babes in Toyland*, Deb has been fully engaged in a great many MasterVoices activities involving musical theater - so much so that if you look thru this MasterVoices website, you will find David Garrison performing a unique and very clever patter song video, as part of MasterVoices' 2023 fundraising efforts, with the notation, "Lyrics by Deb Poppel."

Demitrio Acot has done both solo and ensemble work as a singer spanning multiple genres including jazz, musical theatre, gospel and choral music. He has appeared in a jazz exchange program called Jazz In Out in La Rochelle, France, at NYC jazz venues such as Small's, and as a member of the Harlequin Theatre Company in Riverdale. He has also sung with the Christ Church Riverdale Choir for twenty-two years.

After being enthralled by MasterVoices' production of *Lady in the Dark*, Demitrio auditioned and joined the chorus for *Anyone Can Whistle* in 2022 where he had a small part in a scene with Tony award-winner Santino Fontana.

Demitrio, who has a BS in Marketing and Management from NYU, has worked in real estate, finance and construction. In 2018 he became a licensed real estate appraiser and has his own growing company, Right Choice Appraisal Service, a minority-owned business that is a registered fiduciary of the court. He is often called upon to provide unbiased real estate appraisals in legal matters such as estates, divorce, bankruptcies and guardianships. "I like getting to the truth," Demitrio says, "There will always be opinions and speculation; however, we do the research until the truth uncovers itself. Every appraisal is a puzzle."

A first-generation Filipino-American, Demitrio was brought up by a single mother from the Philippines "who raised three children and worked tirelessly to give us every chance to achieve the American dream." He is divorced, has two daughters, two granddaughters, and resides in the apartment where he was raised.

Demitrio says, "I'm a "business guy but I enjoy expressing my creative side through singing" and "It's a worthwhile thing to be part of bringing life to lesser-known and new works."

MEMBER SINCE 2017

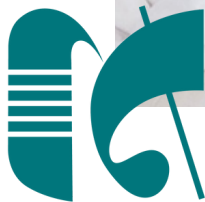
TENOR

Ed got into orchestra management when he was 24 and has been in key leadership positions with the New York Philharmonic and Los Angeles Philharmonic, among others. He is now in public media at the top of WQXR, New York's classical music station, raising money, doing scheduling, strategizing and program development.

SOPRANO

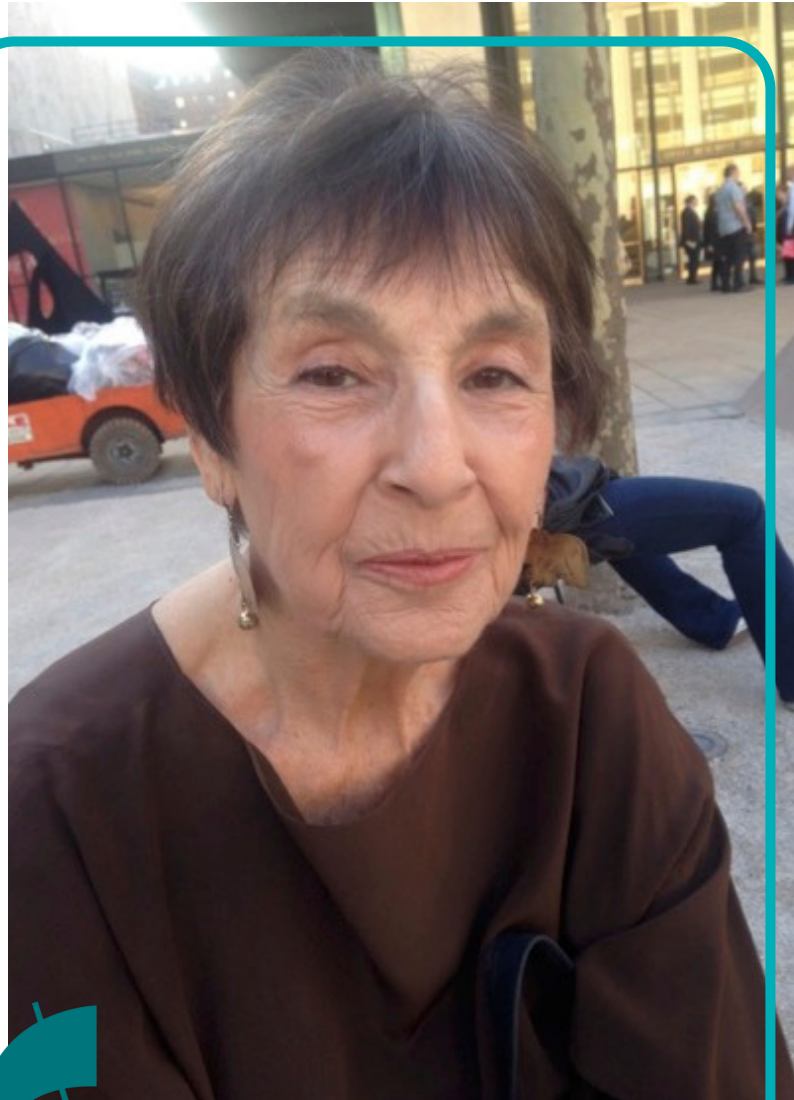

Elise has had three different careers, starting as an actress/singer. She studied with Ute Hagen, performed at the Provincetown Playhouse in *Alice in Wonderland* and *Trial by Jury* (soprano soloist), and did summer stock in Camden, Maine in 1955 doing *Gilbert & Sullivan* and *Shakespeare*.

Elise has spent most of her distinguished professional career in journalism and in publishing. She was one of the original teachers/producers of New York State's public broadcasting network when it was formed in the 1950's, was an associate producer of *Captain Kangaroo* and the Oscar-winning film *The Ten Year Lunch*, and worked in news documentaries at NBC. In her many years as a literary agent for Goodman Associates with her husband, their most recognized work was the 1984

book *What To Expect When You Are Expecting*, which still remains a best seller. "I have had many careers and loved them all. I was a very happy worker," says Elise.

When not singing or taking courses, Elise enjoys time with her children, Peter and Emily, and her six grandchildren ranging in age from three to twenty-four years old. Elise reflects that "Music is such a crucial part of my life. Singing, rehearsing, performing with MasterVoices, going to operas and concerts is central to that. He recalls that his first performance was with Abraham Kaplan conducting the *Beethoven Mass in C Minor*.

Jerry is currently the Director of Finance with the CUNY NYC College of Technology and has been working in the CUNY system for over 39 years including positions at York College and the Bronx Community College. For the past 40 years, he has also served as Conductor for the "Balmy Zepher's" - a vocal chamber group in New York City.

Jerry's clear favorite concert with our chorus was Verdi's, *Nabucco*, conducted by Robert Bass. "I knew while I was singing it, it was the best choral performance I had ever sung in." Since his experience as a summer camp counselor as a teenager, Jonathan has embraced the role of educator and the significant influence teachers can have on their young students - and the gratification a teacher earns from the experience. “I enjoy developing a relationship with the kids and watching them grow and change even in the span of just one school year.”

Singing with MasterVoices is part of Jonathan’s DNA. BASS

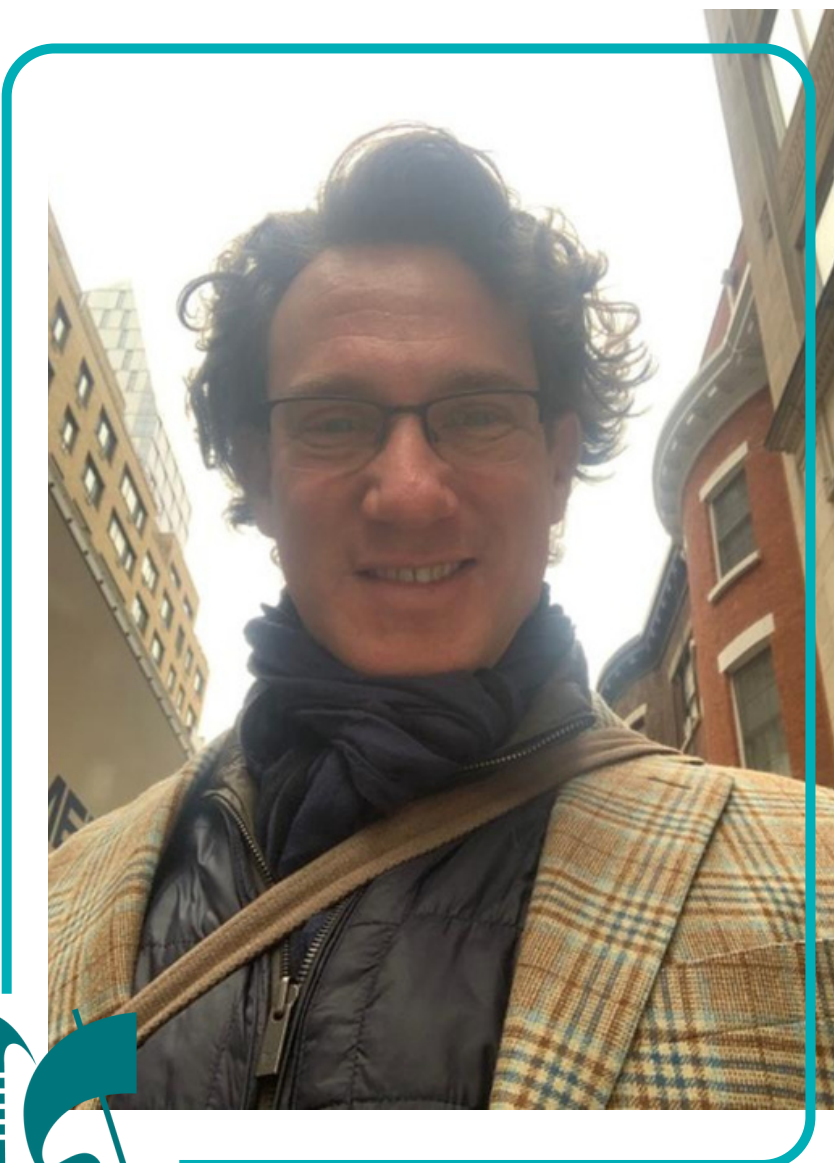

THOMAS HOM

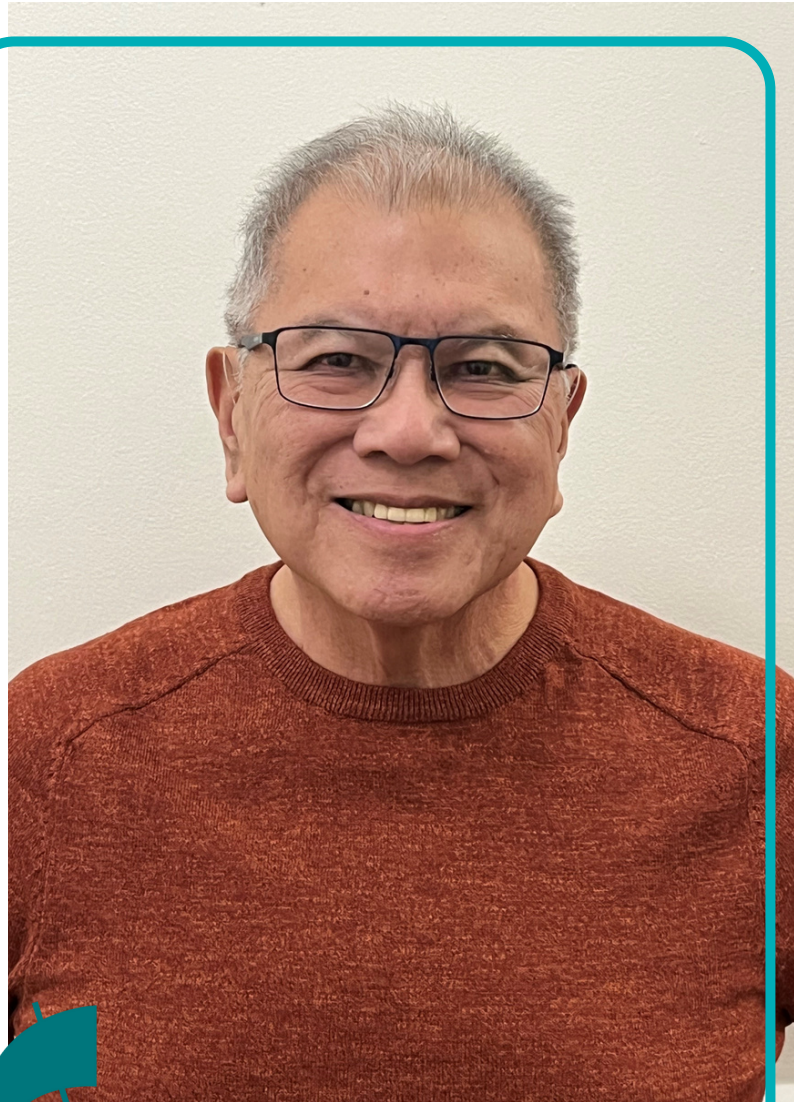
MEMBER SINCE 1980

Among his patients were members of the chorus. In addition to singing, he has been an enthusiast of racquetball, golf, culinary adventures, and world traveling.

Singing Paul McCartney's *Liverpool Oratorio* at Carnegie Hall was a standout experience for Tom, who got to meet the star himself. McCartney not only attended all rehearsals but was also extremely open and accessible to the chorus. Other special memories include the performance of *Elijah* with Bryn Terfel, as well as singing with the chorus for Pavarotti Plus with Luciano Pavarotti, as part of the Richard Tucker Foundation concerts that were broadcast on PBS.

Tom states the combined experience of expanding the musical repertoire from singing the choral classics to opera, and now to staged Broadway theater productions with Ted is the reason for his continued presence with MasterVoices. Where else can you find such immeasurable joy and meaning?
